




MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dear Councillors and Residents,





The Fire Chief is responsible for planning and implementing training. Hundreds of hours are spent each year training in-house and through attending specialized courses. 



PREVENTION

The Fire Prevention Division is represented by the Fire Prevention Officer (FPO). In many respects, he is the face of the Fire Department and the first point of contact with business owners, external and internal partners. agencies and members of the public. He handles many requests throughout the year and his dedication to prevention and fire safety is evident. Our Prevention and Public Education programs support and enhance safety for the community and residents of St. Marys. The annual inspections completed by the Fire Prevention Officer are a key component in enhancing our community's fire safety and knowledge.

Fire Safety Tips from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA)

LOOK

Look for places fire could start. Take a good look around your home. Identify potential fire hazards and take care of them.

LISTEN

Listen for the sound of the smoke alarm. You could have only minutes to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Go to your outside meeting place, which should be a safe distance from the home and where everyone should know to meet.

LEARN

Learn two ways out of every room and make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily and are free of clutter.

PUBLIC EDUCATION

Public Education is a key component of fire prevention. Fire Prevention and Suppression staff take part in educating residents of all ages, from school-aged children to senior citizens. Whenever firefighters are on scene, it is our policy not to leave a house without a working smoke alarm and/or carbon monoxide alarm.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

In the event that the Mayor declares a Town emergency, the St. Marys Emergency Response Plan ensures a coordinated response for the St. Marys community. The plan provides key officials, agencies and departments within the Town of St. Marys with a general guideline to the initial response to an emergency and an overview of their responsibilities.

EMERGENCY EXERCISES

On Thursday, May 31, 2018, the Town of St. Marys brought together 11 organizations and over 100 staff to conduct an emergency exercise. Dubbed "Exercise Toto", the scenario tested the community's response to a simulated tornado touchdown in Rannoch and the west end of St. Marys.

The exercise involved the Town of St. Marys, Ontario Provincial Police, Perth County Paramedics, St. Marys Firefighters, Canadian Red Cross, Victim Services Bruce Grey Perth, Social Services, Salvation Army, Perth Department Health Unit, Stratford-Perth Humane Society, Huron Perth Healthcare Alliance and St. John Ambulance.

Around two dozen citizen-volunteers also participated, including students from St. Marys DCVI and residents from Kingsway Lodge. Acting as evacuees who had their homes destroyed, they were transported by Murphy Bus Lines to a mock Evacuation Centre at the Pyramid Recreation Centre.

The St. Marys Memorial Hospital also conducted their own table-top exercise to test their ability to care for patients after such an event.

The Town led a similar exercise in May of 2017. The 2017 scenario, known as "Exercise Hail Mary," measured the Town's response to a collision that involved a school bus and an oil tanker truck.

OPEN AIR BURNING BY-LAW

The Open Air Burning By-Law regulates the setting of open fires, including establishing the times during which open fires may be set. Here are some things you need to know about the Open Air Burning Bylaw 90-2017 (also known as Recreational Burning).

When is a recreational burn authorized?

- Between the hours of 4:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m.
- No wind, rain, fog or smog
- Only burn clean, dry wood
- Fire no larger than 46cm wide by 46 cm long by 30 cm high
- Three (3) metres clearance from any building structure, property line, tree, hedge and combustible material
- Extinguishing agent readily available
- Fire is supervised

How do I get a burn permit?


If you wish to have an open air burn (camp fire) in the Town of St. Marys, a Burn Permit is required. It can be purchased at the Fire Hall (172 James Street South) during regular business hours.

What's the safest way to burn?

Use a pit like the one pictured below!

From ancient Rome to present day

The history of the firefighter began in ancient Rome while under the rule of Augustus in the 3rd Century. Prior to that there is evidence of fire-fighting in use in Ancient Egypt.

The first Roman fire brigade was created by Marcus Licinius Crassus. He took advantage of the fact that Rome had no firefighters.

Since 1857, through two World Wars and on into the new millennium, the St. Marys Fire Department has been protecting property and saving lives. An impressive collection of historical artifacts will be on display at the St. Marys Museum from the 1st of July (see page 25 for details).


FIREFIGHTING HISTORY
